



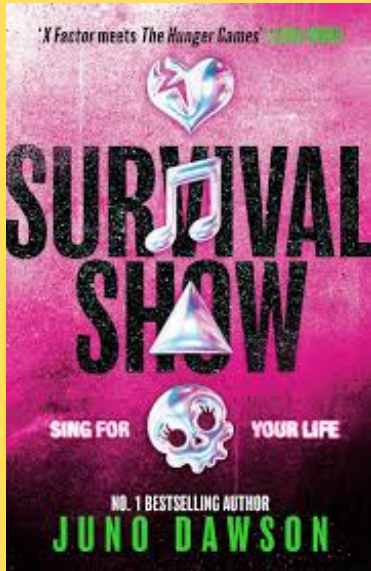

## Melbourne Writers Festival 7-10 May.

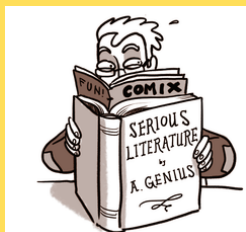

The festival highlights:

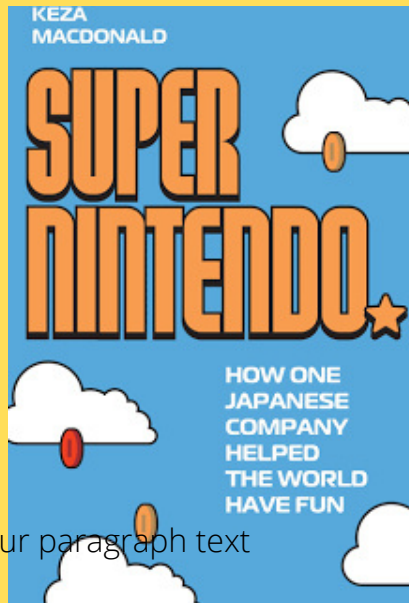
- bold fiction
